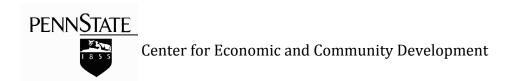




Table 3. Hispanic or Latino Breakdown, 2010 Census










Table 8. Employment by industry, 2012 American Community Survey

The Census Bureau uses a consistent methodology to determine the industry classifications into which employees are assigned across the country. Those that are unable to release information due to disclosure complications are due to the low numbers of industries in that sector, and potential for breaching privacy.
